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The history of JRC includes its founding in 1974 as an outreach ministry of St. Paul's Catholic Church in Canton, Ohio. Father John Robert Coleman brought services to the people of the northeast Canton community through his daily example and vision. The J.R. Coleman organizations were born out of his passion to assist people in need.

On September 5, 2013, the name J.R. Coleman was changed to "JRC" to differentiate our services to the community. This name change sets us apart, strengthens our foundation, and gives us a fresh, new direction for the future.

From the Executive Director

Dear Friends,

JRC has served the community for over 43 years. In the past year, we moved in a new and positive direction. The JRC Board of Directors and Administrative team worked together to refocus the organization on two major initiatives. Those initiatives are early education and adult day services. Over the next two years, JRC will begin the process of letting initiatives, such as senior housing and community development, be addressed by professionals who specialize in those areas, while JRC staff "key in" on early education and adult day services.

The JRC Learning Center has been recognized as a high performing center dedicated to helping children become kindergarten-ready. Did you know 90% of a child's brain is developed in the first three years, and 95% is developed by the time a child reaches kindergarten? JRC is dedicating resources to enhance brain development of our children while providing a quality curriculum, healthy foods, exercise and exposure to the arts—just to name a few of the many experiences children receive every day at the center. Early education is a proven path out of poverty and through dedicated staff, many collaborations and a focus on children and families, JRC is making a difference in the lives of children.

The JRC Adult Day Center has been referred to as a "model" by Direction Home Area Agency on Aging. Did you know that by the year 2025, 23% of all people residing in Stark County will be 65 years old or older? Adult day services are an affordable option in the process of aging for seniors as they require care. Caregivers also benefit knowing their loved one is in a safe and engaging place while the caregiver works or receives respite.

Our method of engaging seniors in activities ensures they feel capable, purposeful and engaged. You see, we have this motto: "Senior citizens can do anything anyone else can do. However, they may need to do it a little differently." The staff at JRC Adult Day Center plans activities with this in mind.

The future of JRC is one of growth and expansion. JRC moved into its new adult day facility at 3300 Parkway NW in Canton in September 2016. That facility is located in the former Meyers Lake Ballroom. JRC's future includes the purchase of that property and co-locating a second early education center at that same facility serving families and businesses in NW and SW Canton. This strategic initiative will take place over the next few years as JRC continues to address the needs of the community.

JRC's Adult Day Center leased the Garden Room of the Meyers Lake Ballroom from Triner Enterprises in September 2016. The new location features a larger, more open environment, memory room, courtyard and Bistro-style area for meals and snacks. JRC's future plans to purchase the building will allow expansion of the Adult Day services, a large kitchen and the ability to build a second learning center.

Finally, I want to share my son's experiences at the JRC Learning Center. Not long after I joined JRC's Board of Directors, my wife and I made the choice to enroll our eldest son into JRC's Learning Center and it was one of the best decisions that we've ever made.

From the 'Healthy Habits' food to the specialized curriculum, our son benefited greatly from being at JRC's Learning Center. He'll be one of the first to tell you that he likes broccoli and will eat it without complaint. This past fall, he started kindergarten at Plain Local Schools. The week before he started kindergarten, the school had a short placement test to see where all the students were, in terms of material that would be covered in kindergarten. We were told that he would be in the room for about 20 minutes, as he would continue to answer questions until he no longer knew the answers. Instead of being in the room for 20 minutes, he was in there for almost 40 minutes, indicating he was, in fact, ready for kindergarten. Currently all of his test scores in school, have been at or above the level where they should be.

This past year was full of many changes for JRC and we anticipate another great year full of more positive changes. I know that the board is committed to growing JRC and making it the best organization for educating children, engaging seniors and strengthening community!



Nhat's so Great About Norms!

The teachers at the JRC Learning Center employ Creative Curriculum to provide early education and experiences to toddlers and preschool children. As this 'worm' story conveys, Ohio Department of Education's Early Learning and Development Standards are taught through daily experiences and interests of children.

A preschool class went out to the playground. Some of the children found a plastic tote lid that had been left on the grass. When they moved it, they found that the ground was covered with worms. The teacher got a jar for the children to collect the worms. When the class went back to the room, the teacher asked the children to observe the worms and describe them. Here is how the class was able to meet many Learning Objectives through a natural experience and the children were motivated to participate and learn because of their interest in the subject.

Language Skills: The children were able to learn language skills by describing how the worms looked and how they moved.

Reading Skills: The teacher used chart paper to write the words that the children used. The children were able to see the words, thus building reading skills.

Science: The teacher was able to explain to the children the body parts of the worm and why they are important in a garden which meets Science Standards.

Math: The children also compared the different sizes of the worms and used a string to measure them. The children counted the worms. This met Math Standards.

Social Skills: While participating in this activity, the children were also building Social Skills by taking turns, listening to others, regulating their emotions and building relationships and interactions with adults.

So, what's so great about worms?

Intentional learning via spontaneous, daily discovery opportunities!





Since 1980, the JRC Adult Day Center has offered Adult Day Services to older adults. In the fall of 2016, the Adult Day Center moved to its new location at 3300 Parkway St. NW, Canton, Ohio 44708. The seniors have enjoyed this large, open space with attached courtyard, Bistro, sensory/memory room, and a full schedule of activities and events!


JRC Adult Day Center is one of the only centers in Stark County which provides a social model of daytime services, rather than a medical model.



JRC Home Repair

JRC Home Repair provides services to seniors who are primarily low-income homeowners. Our goal is to enable homeowners to continue to reside in their homes safely. During fiscal year 2017, 67 renovations and repairs were completed. The type of work completed included minor plumbing repairs, ceiling and floor replacement, bathroom

modifications to install shower stalls with transfer seating, hand held shower heads and grab bars, widening of doorways and entries to accommodate walkers or wheelchairs, and installation of interior and exterior railings as well as a variety of smaller household repairs.





JRC Senior Housing

Located at 1732 Market Avenue N in Canton, the 65 unit HUD-approved independent living community provides safe and affordable housing for individuals 62 years and older, or on disability. In FY 2017, a part-time JRC Service Coordinator connected 399 tenants to 777 needed services. 66 individuals currently call JRC Senior Housing home.


JRC Community & Economic Development

The Mahoning Road Corridor
Project continued making great
strides in FY 2017. Phase 1 of the

Phase 2 bids were awarded and work began in the Fall of 2017.

The Wellness Village at Midway, a 36-unit senior housing facility, was an investment along the completed corridor. These new buildings along with the new roadway brought a refreshing new look to the community.

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


